



In conversation with

Adam Feak



When God challenged me in 2019 to pack in my dream of becoming a physiotherapist and study theology instead, I really had no plan in which direction this would take me. To the world, it seemed a preposterous move; I was just about to finish biology night school and had received offers from a few universities to begin the path of physiotherapy. But as we all know and learn again and again, God has other plans contrary to ours.

Before coming to Christ, I was helplessly addicted to drugs and I was stuck in a perpetual cycle. Thanks be to God that though I used to be a slave to sin, he has now set me free through His son.

During my first year at Moorlands College, being a campus-based student at the time, I lapped up any opportunities my placement church gave me, such as preaching, kids groups, leading services, Alpha groups, etc.

God kept telling me to bless others through my past. Then, one day, God put these words on my heart: prison ministry. Soon after this, I was able to visit HMP Winchester and shadow the chaplaincy team there. I asked them if I could do a placement

in Winchester and to my delight it was a yes. I switched my mode of learning to placement-based at Moorlands and was all geared up to enter the second year of my degree programme.

But then, to my horror, the pandemic hit. I was worried that the pandemic would take away my chances to serve since volunteers were not allowed into the prison. But God is good. Every prisoner has the legal right to access faith specific support from their particular faith.

I have been serving in HMP Winchester for 8 months now with the chaplaincy team. I have seen people come from the grips of the sin to being freed in Christ. I have seen others becoming obsessed with the word of God pouring their heart and time into Scripture and prayer. There is still a great struggle within the prison for the enemy is rife, but I have come to see now how God is using my past to bless others. Speaking about my past opens up conversations even more deeply than I could possibly imagine – and having tattoos also helps!

I could not have reached where I am today, firstly without God, but also not without the time and wisdom of the lecturers at Moorlands. They have challenged me to rewire and rethink so many

thought patterns and all of this has impacted the way in which I speak and engage with others in the prison.

The Christian Doctrine lectures inspired me to put together a doctrine basics course for the guys which I'm excited to launch. The Worship lectures have challenged me to prepare and deliver services in different ways. The essay on preaching the gospel in five minutes has come in very handy when the prisoners are wanting to turn their lives over to Jesus.

I'm so thankful to have been taught the skills I need to keep on digging deep and study all the more. Coming to Moorlands College has changed my life for the better.



Celebrating over 70 years

1948

Birth of a vision

David Clifford spends six months travelling in America and has a vision to start a new training initiative back in the UK to enable and equip young people for evangelism. Clifford subsequently purchases a large house in Matlock, Derbyshire, as premises for a new college and conference venue.

Matlock Bible College

Matlock Bible College starts with just eight students, plus John Welch as Principal and lecturer, and Clifford as Vice Principal.

Intentionally practical from day one, early students are even given medical training – covering minor surgical procedures, basic medicine and obstetrics – in response to the needs of post-war missionaries working in remote areas of the world. Later David Clifford would himself become Principal.

1949-67

From Derbyshire to Devon

With student numbers increasing, the college relocates to Dawlish, Devon. Meanwhile, the word 'Matlock' is replaced with 'Moorlands' in the college's title, inspired by the fact the area surrounding the new premises includes Dartmoor,

Exmoor and Haldon Moor. By 1967, the college is thriving and student numbers are at an all-time high.

1968-69

Changing times

At a time of political and social change globally, and unrest within the UK Church over the rising charismatic movement, Moorlands College encounters difficulties and is re-established in Verwood, Dorset, but no staff or students transfer from Devon. Student numbers at the college plummet from over 100, down to just seven.

1970

The vision is passed on

Moorlands College re-opens in a large converted manor house in Sopley, with the support of an American mission – who provide Moorlands College not only with its new home, but also its new Principal: Dr Derek Copley.

1971-98

A time to build

Moorlands College grows its campus facilities over several years during the early 1970s, whilst the old manor house finally becomes so unsafe it's pulled down. In 1995, under its new partnership with Cheltenham & Gloucester College of Higher Education, Moorlands College awards its first validated Diploma, followed one year later by a BA degree.

1999

The fourth Principal in 50 years

Rev Dr Steve Brady is appointed Principal; only the fourth person to hold the post in Moorlands College's history.

2013-15

Growth across the UK

Our training is now more accessible than ever, thanks to new Regional Centres opening at the invitation of others – very often college alumni. The first opens in the South West in 2013, supported by South West Youth Ministries (SWYM); and followed one year later by our Midlands Regional Centre. Back in Sopley, nearly £3 million is raised to build a new community Hub and Auditorium, opened in 2015 by Baroness Caroline Cox.

2019-21

Looking ahead

Revd Dr David Hilborn joins our Moorlands College staff team as our fifth Principal in 70 years.

Moorlands College and Wycliffe Bible Translators announce collaboration to establish a new 'School of Language and Scripture' at Moorlands College. The School offers a Masters programme (MA in Language, Community and Development), aimed at UK and international students serving with Bible translation organisations around the world.

A new Regional Centre is started in Belfast supported by Youth Link in 2020.

The demands of the world and the nature of education may be continually shifting, but the need for sound biblical and theological training never dwindles.

Your choices



Are you looking to grow practically and apply your theology?

At Moorlands College, we're committed to Scripture. With us, you'll receive solid, theological teaching in a way that best suits your circumstances. Expand your knowledge of God, put your learning into practice through a placement, and gain lifelong friends.

Knowing that God calls every student to an individual ministry, we offer different modes and locations of study to help provide you with the best possible learning environment.

BA (Hons) modes of study

As a BA student you have the choice of whether to study as a Christchurch campus-based student, a Christchurch placement-based student or a Regional Centre placement-based student. Each mode of study has different benefits giving you flexibility to choose which mode of study and location best suits your circumstances.



Christchurch campus-based

Studying at our beautiful campus, near Christchurch, Dorset enables you to study full-time for a degree in Applied Theology, whilst living, learning and strengthening friendships in a dedicated Christian community. Students are taught and mentored by our experienced staff and teaching is spread across the week allowing you to gain a broader knowledge of the Bible whilst attaining practical ministry skills.

- As a campus-based student, you'll usually attend your placement (church or Christian organisation) a couple of times every week in the academic term, providing you with vital ministry experience alongside your studies.
- Campus-based students also get to take part in two five-week block placements. Whether UK-based (level 5 & 6) or overseas (level 6), block placements are a great opportunity to get intensive experience in a chosen area of ministry.
- You'll be part of a mixed tutor group giving you regular opportunities to grow as part of a smaller, family-like community of believers.



Christchurch placement-based

As a placement-based student at our Christchurch Campus, you will be immersed in the life of a local church or organisation as well as attending Moorlands College. In a number of cases this is in the form of paid employment.

Each year you'll attend three five-day study blocks that are run at our Christchurch Campus bringing together placement-based students from all our Regional Centres. Additionally, during term-time, you will attend our Christchurch Campus one day a week.

- You'll be totally immersed in your placement throughout the year.
- You'll have access to regular tutor group sessions as well as a personal tutor for dedicated one-to-one support.
- Placement-based students also get the opportunity to complete an alternative placement alongside their weekly placement.



Placement-based in the South West

Our South West Regional Centre, supported by SWYM, delivers the placement-based BA (Hons) Applied Theology programme. Our degree, with an emphasis on missional leadership studies, prepares you for professional Christian service, and the interaction between theory and practice is a key feature. We believe that whilst it is really important to know the theory, the majority of learning comes through practically doing it.

As a result, all students are placed with a placement church or ministry organisation, where you will be doing practical ministry for somewhere between 60-80% of your time.







Placement-based in the Midlands

Our Midlands Regional Centre focuses on delivering both our BA (Hons) Applied Theology and BA (Hons) Applied Theology (Youth and Community Work) with JNC Professional Qualification as placement-based options, giving you the opportunity to be on placement whilst also studying. Study blocks are held throughout the academic year, with accommodation available at both locations.



Placement-based in Northern Ireland

Our Northern Ireland Centre, supported by Youth Link:NI, delivers the placement-based BA (Hons) Applied Theology (Youth and Community Work) with JNC Professional Qualification programme, enabling you to be on placement whilst studying. You'll be taught via study blocks throughout the academic year, allowing you to fully engage in activities at a local Northern Ireland placement.

MA modes of study

As an MA student you will study at our Christchurch Campus. The **MA Applied Theology** is part-time and during year one and two you will attend study blocks at the Christchurch Campus. You then have a further two years to for the dissertation.

The MA Language, Community and

Development has three stages: Postgraduate Certificate, Postgraduate Diploma and dissertation.

The Postgraduate Certificate runs from September to February; the Postgraduate Diploma runs from February to July and you will be based at our Christchurch Campus.

Whether you're living here as a campus-based student during term time, or staying for a study block, all student will spend time at our Christchurch Campus. Here you'll have access to spaces devoted to study, worship, relaxation and fellowship.

Residential facilities

Our accommodation is available to both campusbased students and those on study blocks. Our residential areas give you 24-hour access to our laundry room, relaxing prayer room, and student kitchen. The accommodation block has three lounges providing the use of a piano, pool table and TV/projector.

Stretch yourself physically

Take the free induction and gain access to our fully equipped on-site gym. We have a treadmill, cross-trainer, cycling and rowing machines, as well as a free-weights and mat area. Our sports hall, with its own changing rooms and shower facilities, is right next to the gym. Enjoy a game of badminton, table tennis or five-a-side football with friends after lectures.











Campus-based living

Life in community

Christchurch campus-based students are given opportunities to be stretched and to grow in a shared setting. Learn from, and be mentored by, experienced teaching and tutoring staff. Identify your future ministry and be part of a Christian community who are passionate about sharing the Gospel.

Space for you

Express yourself in worship, share community with friends and study in a relaxed, countryside location. At our Christchurch Campus, we have spaces designed for your spiritual, relational and personal development.



Chapel services are held in our Wessex Auditorium and are integrated into BA students' timetables. Our Chapel band, comprising student musicians and singers, lead times of sung worship. Staff, students and visiting speakers from across the UK host the services.

Our Hub is perfect for both socialising and studying. Quiet booths and sofa areas are available for students who wish to work in a more open environment whilst looking out on the neighbouring fields and paddocks. A variety of meals are served by our dedicated kitchen team, who are often bringing new and diverse options to the daily menu.

Tutor groups

As an undergraduate student, you'll regularly be in contact with your personal tutor. As part of the campus-based community, tutor groups often venture off-site on Wednesdays for activities such as beach walks and river boating.

Our grounds

Our rural location provides the ideal place for personal reflection. We have an on-site fire pit which is a popular student space for worship



nights. The extensive grounds also give you the opportunity to organise team sports. Why not dress up and compete in the annual fancy-dress volleyball competition? Get an Ultimate Frisbee team together or start up a fitness group! Our grounds offer you all these opportunities and more.

Work duties

We allocate work duties for campus-based students during term time, to provide our students with practical skills and encourage a servant-hearted community. Your duties might involve library work, supporting the kitchen after meal times, technical support or property maintenance.







Shape your student experience

Every student deserves our time and respect

College life can be a challenge – both for your heart and mind. Our pastoral team can offer you advice, pray with you, and signpost you to further support whenever you need.

You have a significant part to play in how we do things at Moorlands College. As a student, you can use your voice and energy to make a real impact during your time with us.

Student Representative Association

Have your say and represent the student body. Just like a Students' Union, our Student Representative Association gives you the opportunity to influence how your programme and its teaching are delivered. The association, headed up by an elected student chair, consists of student representatives appointed every year by their peers. Members of the group communicate regularly with both students and staff, to ensure opinion from across the college's locations is actively sought.

Christchurch Campus Community Council

In addition, our Christchurch Campus has a council dedicated to community life on-site. Student members of the council work hard to give you the best student experience whilst also building a strong, Christ-centred community for learning and living together.

As well as arranging times of worship, fellowship and prayer through the week, our community team always do their best to help you relax and socialise away from lectures. Share testimonies during Orientation Week events, put on a show at the ever-popular Winter Variety Performance, and celebrate with friends at the Summer Ball.

Our local community needs us

Do you have a heart for outreach? Our council gives you the opportunity to serve and show Jesus to the community; such as spending time with the homeless in Bournemouth, or offering water to latenight clubbers. We also support the local village of Sopley by providing gardening services.

Placements

Our programmes are inherently practical – designed so you can put your learning into practice. You will have the opportunity to gain experience, develop your skills and gifting whilst service within a variety of placement settings, including the local church, Christian organisations, charities and community groups.

As a BA student (including Foundation Year students) studying at any of our locations, you will build a portfolio that reflects your spiritual, practical, academic and relational development within your placement setting.

Time on placement

- Foundation Year students typically spend three days per week in their placement.
- BA campus-based students usually attend their placement a couple of times every week, located within convenient travelling distance of the campus.
- Placement-based students are fully immersed in the life of a placement church or organisation local to them.

- Campus-based students also get to take part in two five-week block placements. Whether UK-based (level 5 & 6) or overseas (level 6), block placements are a great opportunity to get intensive experience in a chosen area of ministry.
- Placement-based students also get the opportunity to complete an alternative placement alongside their weekly placement. Alternative placements are a great opportunity to widen experience and knowledge of ministry and practice.

Applying all you are learning

Alongside your studies, you can get involved at your placement in a variety of ways. Your placement is a great way for you to develop, and will engage you in a community outside of the college. For example, you might deliver children's talks; lead youth events; preach at a church service; run an evangelistic sporting event; reach out to international students; work behind the scenes at a church service; or help at a local Foodbank.



Beyond the lecture room

Our undergraduate programmes are designed for you to reflect upon your personal growth through portfolios and self-reflective essays. The approach to the BA programmes provides students with practical opportunities to learn and thrive.

You will learn and encounter God beyond the walls of the lecture room; whether discovering Old Testament-related artefacts at the British Museum, visiting a working monastery, reflecting on personal development through team-based outdoor activities or embarking on a retreat as part of the BA in Applied Theology (Youth and Community work).

Exploring Israel

How would a first-hand experience of the Holy Land affect your understanding and appreciation of biblical stories? Lecturer Dr Chris Sinkinson regularly leads a visit to Israel, giving you the opportunity to encounter in person the places we read about in Scripture. Travel around Galilee, ride camels in the desert of Zin, meet with local people, explore the bustle of Jerusalem, experience narrow streets and underground tunnels, and learn about the claims that surround particular archaeological sites.

"Long ago, St Jerome described the Holy Land as the Fifth Gospel", emphasises Dr Chris Sinkinson, Lecturer in Old Testament and Apologetics.
"Travelling the contemporary world of Galilee or the Dead Sea brings the words of the Gospel writers to life in a very special way. It has always been a trip of a lifetime – but don't go thinking this is just an excuse for a holiday! We emphasise study on the trips. This formative experience can be part of your theological reflection for years to come. There is nothing quite like worshipping as a group out on the Sea of Galilee or praying together in a suburb of Jerusalem to give the Bible colour. Studying theology is heart, mind, soul and strength and the Moorlands College Israel tour integrates them all."



Student welfare

Personal tutoring and tutor groups

We ensure you're valued, encouraged and supported throughout your time studying at Moorlands College. You will be assigned a personal tutor, in whom you can confide, and who will provide pastoral support and a perspective on your studies.

If you're a Foundation Year or Christchurch campus-based student, you'll be in a tutor group with students from all years, giving you a diverse, prayerful, support network during your studies. You'll meet regularly during term time, and enjoy activities such as beach walks, river boating and volleyball competitions.

The tutor support system for placement-based students works slightly differently. Even though your focus is more on your placement church or organisation, our staff still ensure you're supported as much as possible during your studies. As a Christchurch placement-based student, you'll meet with your tutor group on your weekly teaching day, to touch base with your tutor and pray with others in your year.

As a South West, Midlands or Belfast Regional Centre student, a tutor will be assigned to you and will be in regular contact to see how you're getting on. During study blocks, you'll regularly be in contact with others in your year, and virtual tutorials are also available to help your academic and personal growth away from the lecture room.

Chaplains

Our College Chaplains work alongside other team members at Moorlands College, offering spiritual support, pastoral care and moral guidance for students. They provide a confidential pastoral care service for those who wish to book appointments aiming to assist students work through issues in a holistic manner and encouraging them to develop greater resilience and spiritual growth in Christ.

The Chaplains are available during the college term time for students across all centres and programmes. Our Chaplains help people make their own choices, whilst walking alongside them through issues such as relationships, mental health, guidance and calling. If the matters are complex, our Chaplains signpost to NHS services or Christian counsellors as appropriate.

In conversation with

Chloe Livingstone

There are many reasons why I decided to study at Moorlands College with the South West Regional Centre.

I had already completed a gap year with South West Youth Ministries and had an incredible time building friendships and deepening my relationship with God. This spurred a desire to go deeper, and Moorlands gave me the opportunity to do exactly that.

One of the reasons I chose the South West Regional Centre was the fact that I got to live in my hometown whilst I studied. Who wouldn't want to finish an essay and then jump in the sea to unwind? I get to enjoy all of my favourite things about the South West, whilst gaining new experiences like travelling to the locations of study for block weeks.

Furthermore, being a placement-based student gave me the opportunity to connect with my local community, whether it was through Messy Church sessions or visits to the coffee shop.

Equally, the topics covered by this degree are vast and fascinating. I got to dive into Church History whilst furthering my understanding of key doctrines, including atonement and creation. One of my favourite modules was 'Frameworks of Applied Theology'. We explored various models of practical theology which was incredibly helpful as I carried out my placement.

The best thing about studying with Moorlands is that our learning contributes to our lives and ministry. The knowledge we gain is not stuck in our heads – it gets lived out in our churches, villages and communities. And we do not undertake this learning alone. We are embedded in a rich community of faith, surrounded by supportive tutors and other like-minded students.

Skills support services:

- **2.** Specialist Study Skills to support students living with an Autistic Spectrum diagnosis
- Mentoring support for students living with a Mental Health diagnosis impacting their ability to study.

Supplementary Study Skills Support

Our Learning Assistance team also offers sessions to support you in improving your academic writing. They will help you understand the marker's feedback on your assignments and teach you skills and strategies for improving your work. We have bespoke packages of support for students who have English as an Additional Language (EAL) and students who have had a break from academic studies before they come to Moorlands and would like to refresh their academic skills.

Foundation Year

Our Foundation Year gains you direct access onto either of our BA programmes.

If you've been out of education for some time, or do not have the necessary qualifications for the BA, this is the option for you. We equip you with a basic biblical and theological understanding and provide an introduction to Christian ministry.

Two days per week are spent in college during term time, at the Christchurch Campus, and you spend the rest of the time in your placement organisation. As a Moorlands College student, you play a full and vital part in the college community – with the opportunity to use on-site accommodation, attend our Chapel services, share meals with other students, and be part of a tutor group.

Content of studies

The Foundation Year is available at our Christchurch Campus and is designed to effectively prepare you for entry onto either the **BA** (Hons) Applied Theology or **BA** (Hons) Applied Theology (Youth and Community Work) degree programmes. Your own personal and spiritual development is central to the Foundation Year, and the development of effective academic study skills is integral to all that is taught. You're also encouraged to regularly reflect on your learning in the context of your existing placement – which may typically be a church or Christian organisation.

The Foundation Year comprises five modules: Biblical Studies, Theological Studies, Personal and Spiritual Development, Ministry, and Placement and Portfolio.

All modules will contain opportunities for the development of study skills, both through teaching methods and assessment tasks.

The weekly lecture teaches writing, research, oral and written communication as well as critical thinking, essential for all the modules. The formative tasks enable you to practise these skills.

Assessment and feedback

You compile a portfolio of work throughout the year, as a record of engagement in placement activities. In addition, you will complete assignments, including written essays and presentations.

FY1 - Biblical Studies

This module provides the historical setting of the Bible and enables an appreciation for reading and interpreting different biblical genres. It develops an awareness of specific themes, such as creation and the Kingdom of God.

FY2 - Theological Studies

You will experience a systematic overview of Theology, covering topics such as faith, God, Jesus, salvation, church and heaven.

FY3 - Personal and Spiritual Development


A module which covers various themes such as discipleship, accountability and relational growth, teamwork and leadership.

FY4 - Ministry: Theory and Practice

A module that has a variety of topics such as working with children, young people and families, church leadership, global mission and evangelism. Practitioners are involved in teaching the module.

FY5 - Placement and portfolio

This module teaches students how to be reflective practitioners and provides an opportunity to apply the learning to a placement context.




BA (Hons)

Applied Theology

The aim of the Applied Theology degree is to equip you to serve God with integrity and confidence in a range of different settings.

Whether you are called to the local church, education, business, politics, the arts, the charity sector, or other vocational spheres, the Applied Theology programme will help you to develop a biblical and theological grounding for your work.

One of the programme's main aims is to help you integrate your academic studies with your practical ministry. This is facilitated largely through the Practice module. This module requires you to work in a placement context, using your skills and insight to serve others. The Practice module teaches you to reflect deeply and critically on your practice, helping you to gain wisdom and ability both during and beyond your time at the College. The Practice module runs through the whole programme and constitutes a quarter of your studies each year.

Placements

If you choose to study via the placement-based mode of delivery at the Christchurch Campus, or in one of the Regional Centres, you will undertake all of your practice hours in a local placement setting. If you study as a campus-based student, in the second and third year of your studies, in addition to your local placement, you will have the opportunity to undertake a 5-week block placement. In the second year, this block placement will take place in the British Isles. In the third year, you will have the opportunity to travel outside the British Isles.



Programme content

In addition to the Practice module, the Applied Theology degree helps you grow through a range of taught modules. Year one provides you with a foundation in biblical studies as you study the Old and New Testament, alongside biblical hermeneutics. In the New Testament module, you will cover the Synoptic Gospels (Matthew, Mark, and Luke) and one of Paul's letters.

The focus will be on interpreting these texts in light of their historical and cultural context, whilst paying attention to the authors' key themes and aims. In the Old Testament module you will gain a greater understanding of the Old Testament world and a stronger grasp of the Old Testament timeline. In year one you will also explore key issues for today, such as the role of the Church in God's mission and an introduction to world religions, alongside looking to the past to learn more about church history and doctrine.

The beginning of wisdom is this: Get wisdom. Though it cost all you have, get understanding.



In year two, you will continue to build a strong knowledge of Scripture with further modules in the Old and New Testament. You will deepen your understanding of core Christian convictions, such as the Triune nature of God and the divinity and humanity of Christ. You will develop your ability to integrate theory and practice through exploring different methodologies for reflective practice.

At this stage, you can also specialise in areas of interest. For example, you can choose to study preaching and church leadership, working with children and families, or working cross-culturally. You could explore the topic of mission in greater depth or think more deeply about intergenerational ministry and community development. If you are a campus-based student, you can also study biblical languages. In all these modules, your lecturers will help you consider how you can best apply what you learn to your life and ministry.

In the final year, to best equip you for your work and ministry beyond the College, you undertake a professional studies module. This module helps you develop key professional skills, such as leading a seminar and researching a topic to teach to others, alongside providing you with a greater knowledge and understanding in the subject area that you choose.

You will also think more deeply about Christian leadership and management in a range of different settings and explore the relationship between the Old and New Testaments. You will continue to specialise as you choose from options that include Pastoral Care, Reformation Theology, Biblical Background, Apologetics and Contemporary Culture, and Christian Spirituality. If you are a campus-based student, you can continue your study of biblical languages.





BA (Hons)

Applied Theology (Youth and Community Work)

Similar to our BA (Hons) in Applied Theology, this programme focuses more specifically on youth and community work. Upon graduation you also receive a JNC Professional Qualification.

"Generation snowflake" or "violent hoodie". Young people are all too often scapegoated, for everything from riots and broken windows to mental health epidemics and being alone together, living life through their phones. But what do you see? Can you see potential in the lives of young people, and want to see it realised?

Youth work is about expanding horizons for young people, and Christian youth workers carry a message of hope, endure disappointments, and lead with love. Youth workers build platforms from which young people can leap, and help fan into flames the gifts they see in others.

Our Applied Theology, Youth and Community Work programme is designed to graduate professional youth workers who love God and love others without compromise, equipping you to serve effectively, making a difference in the lives of those you work amongst.

Professional development

One of the main aims of the Youth and Community Work programme is to help you integrate your academic studies with your work amongst young people and the wider community. This integration is facilitated largely through the Practice module, which runs through the whole programme and constitutes a quarter of your studies each year. This gives you opportunity to reflect deeply and critically on your practice and helps you to develop your youth work skills in different contexts.

Your youth work practice, combined with the taught modules, enables you to receive a Professional Qualification in Youth and Community Work upon completion of your degree. In achieving this qualification, you will demonstrate the full range of JNC competencies, including building professional, transformative relationships, safeguarding the health and welfare of young people, working with relevant agencies, and managing activities and colleagues.

Placements

If you study in one of the Regional Centres or via the placement-based mode of delivery at the Christchurch Campus, you will undertake all of your practice hours in a local placement setting. If you study as a campus-based student, in the second and third year of your studies, you will have the opportunity to undertake a 5-week block placement in addition to your local placement. In the second year, this block placement takes place within the British Isles. In the third year, you will have the opportunity to travel outside the British Isles. Both placement-based and campus-based students are required to undertake an additional placement within an alternative setting to your weekly placement.

Programme content

In addition to the Practice module, the degree helps you develop your professional ability through a range of taught modules. Year one provides you with a foundation in biblical studies and Christian doctrine. You will also have the opportunity to explore important trends in contemporary youth culture, examine the nature and role of the Church in today's work, and undertake an introduction to world religions. You will engage with vital topics for community work such as safeguarding, inclusion and equality, and informal education.


In year two, you will continue to deepen your biblical knowledge. You also develop your ability to integrate theory and practice through exploring frameworks for reflective practice. You will begin to specialise more, studying Youth and Community Work modules to sharpen your knowledge and understanding for effective ministry. In all these modules, your lecturers will help you consider how

you can best apply what you learn to your particular context.

In the final year, you focus heavily on your Youth and Community Work professional studies module. This module helps you develop key vocational skills, such as leading a seminar and researching a topic to teach to others. You will also learn more about leadership and management in a range of different settings. You will continue to specialise as you choose from options that include Family Development and Interventions, Pastoral Care, Christian Spirituality, and Apologetics and Contemporary Culture.

MA

Applied Theology

The aim of the MA in Applied Theology is to help you root your practice more deeply in Scripture and develop a sharper insight into opportunities and challenges in your particular context.

Study theology alongside others in a unique way that encourages both personal growth and professional development – all without the need to leave your responsibilities at home or work.

The MA in Applied Theology requires the completion of 180 credits. The programme effectively has two main parts: the taught element, which accounts for 120 credits; and the dissertation, worth 60 credits.

Also, your choice of specialism is reflected in every module you study – through break-out groups, assessment tasks and your dissertation topic.

In year one, you'll be introduced to the concepts of applied and practical theology, exploring the significance and implications of establishing solid theological foundations as a basis for your practice. In the second module, you'll then study your chosen specialism in greater detail.

Year two begins with the important area of ethics as it relates to ministry and professional practice. You then have opportunity to develop further your studies in your chosen specialism. The fifth and final taught module examines current developments and trends in the twin contexts of Christian practice: the Church and the contemporary world.

From year three, you embark on the final component of the MA in Applied Theology: an 18,000 word dissertation. This involves researching and writing on an applied topic of your choice. It offers the option of expanding on your specialised area of study. You'll be individually allocated a supervisor, appropriate to your field of research, who provides you with ongoing support and guidance throughout the process of research and writing.

Assessment and feedback

Assessment is exclusively by coursework. Most taught modules are assessed by a single assignment, normally of 6,000 words for 30-credit modules and 4,500 for 15-credit modules. These are marked by the relevant module tutor and are returned, together with written feedback, within four weeks.

Timetable

Delivery of the taught components of the MA is by means of two-day intensive study blocks at the Christchurch Campus (plus a one-off induction day). There are four study blocks during the year, typically occurring in September, late November/early December, February and April.

MA Applied Theology

Four specialisms

Developing Christian Leadership

The specialism of Christian leadership equips people for the unique leadership challenges of today and tomorrow. By critically evaluating leadership models and their usefulness in 21st century contexts, this specialist study allows you to reassess how you're leading.

Wherever you lead, whether it's full-time or part-time, ordained or lay, corporate or local church, you will be given a unique opportunity to reflect and assess your effectiveness as a leader and consider how you can make beneficial changes. You'll explore the biblical, theological and practical considerations of leadership; not to build your own empire, but to be used as a Kingdom builder and to develop leadership skills in others. This includes topics such as emotionally intelligent leadership, styles of leadership, developing teams that work, managing change and conflict, and servant leadership.



Chaplaincy

A unique opportunity to explore this missional edge ministry from an evangelical perspective. It will examine the theology, themes, models and practicality of this soft-skilled, inclusive, relational and incarnational ministry and help develop the core chaplaincy skills of spiritual support, pastoral care and ethical guidance. Whether you are already a chaplain and want to develop your CPD and leadership in this area or someone who is exploring a ministry in chaplaincy, you'll find how and why chaplaincy operates so successfully as an acceptable face of Christianity in the public space of work and leisure which has exploded onto the UK scene.

This specialism will examine the theology, models, confidentiality protocols, working with ambiguities and developing resilience within institutions and the place of soulful supervision. It will also explore operating within a pluralistic, multi-faith environment, engaging with liberal secular humanism, new spiritualities and other world faiths whilst retaining your own Christian integrity.



Apologetics and Communication

From Islamic fundamentalism to naturalistic atheism, the Christian faith is being subjected to more critical scrutiny than ever before. The Apologetics specialism engages with relevant issues for evangelism in your context. You will spend time investigating the history of Christian apologetics and key themes, including philosophical arguments, historical evidence and the use of media, literature and the arts.

The study will help you to faithfully defend biblical truth in an ever-changing world and you will also gain tools to help Christians around you to evangelise in their everyday lives. While studying with like-minded students in various areas of practice, you will integrate biblical study with cutting-edge issues in evangelism today.

The Bible and Preaching

Biblical preaching has come under attack in recent years. Some consider it outdated, outmoded, irrelevant – a relic of yesteryear. Others have diluted its substance to such an extent that it becomes little more than a sequence of entertaining stories, loosely woven around a Bible verse or passage. Christians are searching for answers, seeking reassurance, needing to hear the life-changing truths of God's Word.


Sound biblical preaching has never been more needed. However, the world is no longer as it was. Change has come, bringing with it paradigm shifts, cultural revolution and technological innovation.

This sets the stage, not for a return to the golden age of preaching of former generations, but for fresh approaches to faithful biblical preaching, relevant for the 21st century. You will explore preaching in the light of contemporary theories and current homiletical forms. We will be especially concerned with how the Bible functions, and is used, in preaching.

MA

Language, Communication and Development

Our MA in Language, Community and Development is provided as part of our School of Language and Scripture.

The programme will provide essential tools in community-based language development, including linguistics, literacy and Scripture engagement and will equip you for service amongst communities across the world.

This MA has three stages: Postgraduate Certificate; Postgraduate Diploma; and dissertation. In order to get the most from the programme, we recommend you initially register for the Postgraduate Certificate then work in a professional internship, exploring language and development issues within a new community and culture, before returning to reflect on your experiences as you complete the Masters programme. However, if, for example, you have already had substantial experience working in a cross-cultural context, you can choose to register for the full MA.

The Postgraduate Certificate runs from September to February; the Postgraduate Diploma runs from February to July. If you follow the recommended pathway, you will have a further two years for completion of the dissertation.

Programme content

During the Postgraduate Certificate stage, you'll be introduced to the complex interactions between language, culture, community and development issues. The first modules focus on how to 'learn' a new language and culture and how to work well within cross-cultural contexts. You'll have the opportunity to work in teams and reflect on your own contributions, and to develop practical skills and tools in a mentored environment. In the remaining modules, you'll develop foundational skills to work in a particular professional area, whether linguistics and Bible translation, Scripture engagement, literacy education, or language project management.

The Postgraduate Diploma stage gives you the opportunity to reflect on your own cross-cultural experiences and integrate them with theoretical insights into language and culture. The first module focuses on anthropological and sociolinguistic aspects of language, culture, identity and development. After this, you'll have a choice of modules through which you can more deeply explore a specialised professional area.

After completing the taught modules, you'll embark on the final component: an 18,000 word dissertation. This involves researching and writing about a topic of your choice related to language, communities and issues of development. It offers the option of expanding on your specialised area of study, such as an analysis of linguistic aspects of a specific language, or an exploration of language-related development issues for a community with which you have experience. You'll be allocated a supervisor appropriate to your field of research who provides you with ongoing support and guidance throughout the process of research and writing.

Assessment and feedback

Assessment involves a variety of tasks, including exams, portfolios and presentations, but most are standard written assignments. These vary in nature: some require reflection on your own practice or development, and some are more theoretical. Most modules have one or two summative assessment tasks which are marked by the relevant module tutor and are returned, together with written feedback, within four weeks.

MA Language, Communication and Development Three professional pathways

Linguistics

Lead tutor: Dr Cathy Bartram

Linguistics is a crucial part of laying the foundation for all kinds of language development work, including developing a good writing system for the language, producing dictionaries and other language materials, documenting the language for future generations, and translation work.

In the specialism of linguistics, you will learn tools needed to analyse languages. This includes learning how to discover the way that the sound system of a language is functioning, and the way

that words and sentences in a language are put together. It also includes learning how language is tied to society and culture, and how to work together with members of language communities. The focus of the linguistics modules is on practical application, and you will have experience analysing language data from many different countries and languages.

Lead tutor, Dr Cathy Bartram, has 30 years of experience in linguistics and its applications, particularly amongst minority language communities in Asia.



Literacy and Education

Lead tutor: Dr Catherine Young

In this increasingly globalised world, communities are often required to choose between engaging in development opportunities or keeping their language and culture. A community's language is part of the social and cultural fabric that influences the way they see the world. However, non-dominant language communities are frequently marginalized socially, politically, economically and educationally. In fact, speakers of non-dominant languages constitute just eight percent of the total world population but over forty percent of those globally classified as non-literate.

An approach to literacy and education that values language and culture will facilitate effective learning by addressing the barriers that exclude communities from full participation in education and also support effective discipleship and Scripture engagement. Studies in literacy and education will equip participants to encourage and support sustainable, community-centred programmes that enable speakers of non-dominant languages to achieve their educational goals using the languages they speak and understand.

These studies in literacy and education will be led by Dr. Catherine Young who has 30 years of experience in education and development contexts primarily among non-dominant language communities in Asia.

Scripture Engagement

Lead tutor: David Gray


This pathway will equip you to serve in the fascinating area of Scripture engagement. The main goal of Scripture engagement is lives transformed by the Holy Spirit as people and communities engage with Scripture in whatever formats and languages are most helpful. This may involve working closely with the local church or looking for appropriate ways to enable the spread of and engagement with Scripture where there is no local expression of church. This programme will give you the opportunity to think creatively about how to work in both such situations.

The first three weeks or so of this pathway lay the foundations for effective Scripture engagement, by looking at topics such as culture and worldview, the role of language in God's plan, contextualisation, orality and hermeneutics. This is followed by exploring practical tools for engaging with Scripture in different contexts, such as oral Bible studies, trauma healing and digital engagement, as well as thinking through how to work with specific groups (such as Muslims). You will also join with those following the literacy and education pathway to explore aspects of publishing and distributing printed materials, and spend a week learning how to craft and tell oral Bible stories.

The lead tutor is David Gray, who has spent the last 25 years working in Central Asia, the Caucasus, and other parts of Eurasia, both in translation and Scripture engagement, and is a qualified consultant in both domains.

MA Language, Communication and Development

MA Language, Communication and Development Modules

Meaning and Translation

Why do we so often misunderstand each other? And how does that impact our involvement in faithfully communicating ancient messages to contemporary audiences? In the 'Meaning and Communication' module you'll dive into the complexities that influence even the simplest interactions between people speaking the same language, and explore how we work out what others are trying to communicate to us. The 'Translation' module builds on this foundation and opens up the added challenges of communicating across languages and cultures, equipping you with tools for exegesis and Bible translation, and ending with a project to develop and test a section of translated Scripture for an audience of your choice. By the end, you'll have a good appreciation of the complex issues involved in communicating ancient texts to contemporary societies.

Multilingual Education

Speakers of non-dominant languages constitute just eight percent of the total world population but over forty percent of those globally classified as non-literate. One of the reasons for this is that children from minority language communities are required to attend schools in which only the language of the majority population is used. The fact is, children cannot succeed in school if they do not understand what their teachers are saying. Access to national and international languages provides minority language speakers with access to information, paid employment, opportunities to take part in the nation's political processes. Children need to be able to gain access to the languages of the dominant society without sacrificing their own languages and cultural heritage. Studies in multilingual education will equip you to support formal and community-based education programmes in some of the most marginalised communities of the world bringing new opportunities to children previously denied access to appropriate education.

Entry requirements

Foundation Year:

To be accepted onto this stage of the programme you need to have the potential to succeed in it and to benefit from it. This is normally demonstrated by:

- **Five GCSE's** (including English, see below) at grade C or above, or equivalent qualifications at level 2.
- GCSE in English (Language or Literature) at grade C or above, or equivalent qualifications at level 2, or an IELTS Academic Certificate with an overall score of 6.0 with at least 6.0 in each of reading and writing or nationally-recognised English language-based level 3 award, equivalent to these IELTS scores, from a different testing system.
- An appropriate understanding of, commitment to and suitability for the range of vocations for which these studies prepare you.

Undergraduate BA programmes:

To be accepted onto this programme you need to have the potential to succeed in it and to benefit from it. This is normally demonstrated by:

- **Two A-levels** or other equivalent level 3 qualifications.
- GCSE in English (Language or Literature) at grade C or above, or equivalent qualifications at level 2, or an IELTS Academic Certificate with an overall score of 6.0 with at least 6.0 in each of reading and writing or nationally-recognised English language-based level 3 award, equivalent to these IELTS scores, from a different testing system.
- An appropriate understanding of, commitment to and suitability for the range of vocations for which these studies prepare you.

Postgraduate MA programmes:

MA Applied Theology

A degree in theology or similar subject or equivalent (see below):

We realise that some people interested in our programmes don't have a degree in theology, but have developed a sufficient understanding to succeed in and benefit from it through other means. If you think you may be in this category, please talk to us about your situation.

- A capacity to benefit from the study of practice, as part of your continuing professional or vocational development. You will normally have at least two relevant years of experience, and you will be engaged in practice while you undertake the programme.
- Commitment to Christian life and service not only to gain qualifications, but to continue to strive to go deeper and become more committed in your walk with God.
- Sufficient academic ability: you are normally expected to have a British degree in a theological field.
- GCSE in English (Language or Literature) at grade C or above, or equivalent qualifications at level 2, including an IELTS Academic Certificate with an overall score of 6.5 with at least 6.0 in each of reading and writing or nationally-recognised English language-based level 3 award, equivalent to these IELTS scores, from a different testing system.

MA Language, Community and Development

- An Honours degree at 2:2 or above. If your highest level of formal education was taken outside the UK, please see The University of Gloucestershire's website for detailed information about entry requirements for international students.
- **GCSE in English** (Language or Literature) at grade C or above, or equivalent, or an IELTS Academic Certificate with an overall score of 6.0 with at least 6.0 in each of reading and writing, or equivalent from a different testing system.
- An appropriate understanding of, commitment to, and suitability for, the range of vocations for which these studies prepare you.

If your formal education does not meet these requirements, but you have experience and non-certificated learning to the appropriate level, please get in touch with us to discuss your options. You will need to show evidence of:

- Prior learning, including the learning outcomes of the programmes that you have achieved, and other relevant qualifications and experience, including evidence of how your studies have remained current.
- A capacity to benefit from the study of practice, as part of your continuing professional or vocational development.
- Sufficient academic ability.

Our financial policy is that payment for tuition fees and college-based accommodation is payable in advance at the start of each new term.

Student loans

Tuition Fee Loans are available from Student Finance for the full-time BA (Hons) degree programme, including the Foundation Year if taken as the first year of a four-year degree.
