<b>Brief description</b>	This module introduces students to the theological foundations of the Christian faith. It considers several key doctrines and beliefs, with reference to their historical contexts, controversies, and development. It offers students the opportunity to understand and respond to these doctrines in dialogue with contemporary issues, challenges and objections. Students gain familiarity with the basic structure of evangelical theology, and theological method. They consider several doctrines in detail and gain an awareness of how to use works of systematic theology in formulating their own beliefs.

<b>Indicative syllabus</b>	<p>The module comprises:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• An introduction to the different approaches to and disciplines within Christian theology</li> <li>• A broad overview of church history, including the formation of creeds and confessions in relationship to key doctrinal developments.</li> <li>• An assessment of different scholarly perspectives and approaches, equipping students to be able to identify strengths and weakness of such perspectives.</li> <li>• Exploration of various theological disputes, including how to recognise primary and secondary issues for the church today</li> <li>• Identification and discussion of broad methods of apologetics</li> <li>• The detailed study of several doctrines, normally including the doctrines related to what it means to know God.</li> <li>• Engagement with key objections and challenges to these doctrines, including formulating answers and responses.</li> <li>• Discussion of the importance of Christian doctrine for discipleship and worship</li> </ul>
